Advances in technology that empower individuals by broadening access to information


New technologies create new communication challenges

Demographic growth and change:

Increase in our population +15 to 25%

A more culturally and ethnically diverse population

A larger population age 65 or older

More densely populated areas, intercity, coastal, and suburban



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Government budgets:

Budget forecasts are constrained and could lead to challenges sustaining emergency and disaster management resources and capabilities

Impacts to capabilities and emergency management partners will further strain demands on emergency management
